



Friends,

For some time now we have been in conversation with one another about the direction of the ministry of the church. We have grieved with one another over what used to be and what we used to be able to do. As we continue to journey through the Easter season, we are reminded that God is making all things new. The ministry and work of Salem United Church of Christ are no different. We have experienced (as many churches have) loss and decline, but we have also experienced rich blessings through our ministry together. In order to be the church that we are called to be—and to be the church that our community and the world needs—we need to be honest about where we are and to pray about what tomorrow looks like.

Through our study of scripture, through conversations with many of you, and after having sought out guidance from the Wisconsin Conference resources, we have come to better understand and identify the things that have held us back in the past. In keeping with our Easter faith, and with much prayer and trust in God's care, we have come to recognize the need to re-center the focus of our ministry together. In order to move forward, several foundational shifts will need to take place. First, EVERYTHING we do is ministry. We will need to work together, forgive often, and offer grace, believing the best of intentions in one another.

As we move forward together, we will work within four pillars of the new structure:

1. The church lives and operates within established boundaries. Anything can be done by anyone as long as it's within the boundaries.
2. The Consistory is all about establishing and protecting boundaries, looking long term to set a course, and mentoring leaders.
3. The Ministerial Staff and office staff will coordinate, organize and guide the day to day operations of the church.
4. Every ministry team has real power to take action.

The reasons we're moving in this direction:

1. To be more effective and responsive to the missional needs of the communities and people we serve.
2. To support, rather than burn out our volunteers.
3. To maximize the use of individual people's time and resources (time spent doing ministry rather than meeting about doing ministry).
4. To encourage ministry so that we can grow in all areas.
5. To prioritize what ministries are most important as we look at the resources that are available to us.
6. Our present structure has two main concerns:
 - a. A rapid turn-over of leaders which leads to a lack of communication and ministries that fall through the cracks.
 - b. An inordinate amount of time in meetings is spent reacting rather than looking forward.

The new structure is grounded Biblically and is used in both nonprofit and business settings. This model will allow us to let go of things that no longer serve our mission and ministry and will encourage us to thoughtfully consider how we can BE THE CHURCH in our community and world.

We welcome your input as we begin the work of sorting through and planning what is next for us at Salem. Planning sessions have been set throughout the summer. We value your input and participation as we take these next steps together in ministry. Please note the areas of ministry that you have participated in and when they are gathering. Also, if you have an interest in learning more about any or all of these teams, you are welcome to join us.

FROM THE PARISH NURSE . . .

Measles

Signs and Symptoms

- Fever
- Cough, sneezing
- Inflamed eyes (conjunctivitis)
- Sore throat
- Tiny white spots on the lining of the cheek
- Rash

Measles, also known as rubeola, is a common childhood illness, although adults also are susceptible. The virus that causes the disorder is transmitted by inhalation of infecting droplets such as from a sneeze. Measles is most contagious before the rash appears, making it difficult to avoid the disease. Until the rash disappears, you still can pass it on to others. Once you have had measles, you are permanently immune and will not contract the disease again.

Diagnosis

Measles begins as a fever, often as high as 104 to 105 degrees Fahrenheit, with a persistent cough, sneezing, inflamed eyes (conjunctivitis), and sore throat. After about 4 days, a red, blotchy rash appears on the face and behind the ears. The rash spreads to the chest and back and, finally, to the arms and legs. By the time it reaches the arms and legs, it has begun to fade from the face. The symptoms usually appear 10 to 14 days after exposure to the virus. The diagnosis ordinarily is made on the basis of the characteristic rash and the small white spots on the inside lining of the cheek.

Occasionally, your physician may obtain a blood sample to test for presence of antibodies to the virus, but this is usually done only as a part of a public health survey to define the nature and extent of an epidemic.

How Serious Is Measles?

Normally, the infection lasts for 10 days to 2 weeks, and the person recovers completely. In a small number of cases, pneumonia may develop early in the course of the illness, or complications may arise immediately after appearance of the rash. Encephalitis, which causes vomiting, convulsions, coma, and brain disorders, or a bacterial infection (such as pneumonia) may develop.

Treatment

Medication

Acetaminophen and a sedative cough medicine may be taken. Remain isolated until a week after the rash disappears and stay in bed until the fever disappears. If a bacterial infection develops, your physician may prescribe an antibiotic.

Prevention

The measles vaccine is effective and is usually given as a combined measles/mumps/rubella (MMR) inoculation. Physicians recommend that the MMR vaccine be given to children between 12 and 15 months of age, and again between 4 and 6 years of age (before entering school).

German Measles

Signs and Symptoms

- Rash
- Mild fever

German measles (rubella) is only moderately infectious. It is transmitted by inhalation of droplets of moisture that are carrying the virus. The incubation period is 2 to 3 weeks, and the affected person is contagious for 1 week before the rash appears.

Diagnosis

The symptoms of the disease usually are mild and sometimes are hardly noticed. They may include mild fever, enlarged lymph nodes, and a fine, pink rash that appears on the face, the trunk, and then the arms and legs. The rash usually disappears in 3 to 5 days, lasting no more than 1 day on each part of the body. In many cases, the rash does not even occur. Your physician may take a blood sample to check for antibodies to the virus.

How Serious Is Rubella?

In itself, rubella is a mild infection. Once you have had the disease, you usually are permanently immune. However, if a woman is pregnant when she contracts rubella, the consequences for her unborn child may be severe. The child may have one or more of various problems, including growth retardation, cataracts, rashes, deafness, congenital heart defects, and defects of other organs. The highest risk to the fetus is during the first trimester, but exposure during the second trimester is also dangerous.

Treatment

The infection is allowed to run its course, although taking acetaminophen may help to relieve symptoms. Treatment of a child who was exposed to the disease while in the mother's uterus, particularly in the first trimester, depends on his or her problems and often requires years of medical and surgical care. If you contract rubella while you are pregnant, the risk of congenital deformities should be discussed with your physician.

Prevention

Usually, a combined measles/mumps/rubella vaccination is given. Live weakened (attenuated) vaccine should be given to all girls before they begin menstruating. If a woman is given the vaccine, she must be cautioned to practice birth control or abstinence for at least 3 months after vaccination.

Roseola

Signs and Symptoms

- High fever
- Swollen lymph nodes in the neck
- Rash on trunk and neck

Roseola is caused by human herpes virus 6. The route of transmission is probably through the respiratory system. The viral infection usually affects young children, but can occasionally affect adults. The infection is usually not serious, but occasionally complications may occur.

Diagnosis

The primary symptom is a sudden, high fever (to 104 degrees Fahrenheit) in a child 6 months to 3 years old. The child may be irritable, and his or her lymph nodes become swollen. Convulsions can be caused by the high fever. As the fever goes down, a rash appears on the trunk and neck and may last a few hours to a few days.

Roseola is usually diagnosed by the symptoms and can be confirmed by an antibody test in the blood.

Treatment

Treatment consists of acetaminophen and application of tepid sponges to bring the fever down. The convulsions usually are brief if they occur, but your physician may prescribe anticonvulsant medication.

The Dangers of Aspirin

Aspirin is an effective drug for treating a wide range of symptoms and disorders. We think of it as mild and harmless, but in certain cases, it can be very dangerous. The notable risks are described here.

In Children

Do not give aspirin to children who have a fever. Aspirin seems to be related, in some unknown way, to the very serious condition Reye's syndrome.

In Adults

Aspirin may cause minor bleeding from the stomach, so it should be used only when necessary. If your stools appear black and tarry, you may have gastrointestinal bleeding. Discuss your aspirin use with your physician. He or she may recommend a coated aspirin or as aspirin substitute such as acetaminophen.

Ongoing Opportunities

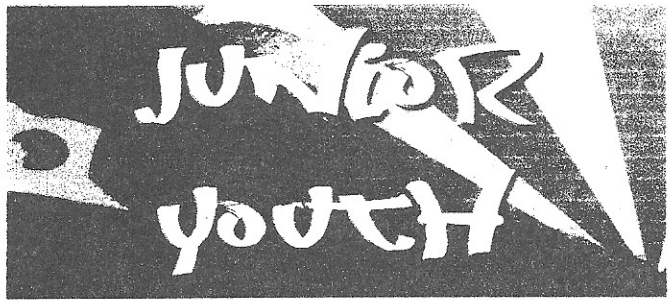

Salem is hosting the Band Concert Concessions in the Park on August 8th.

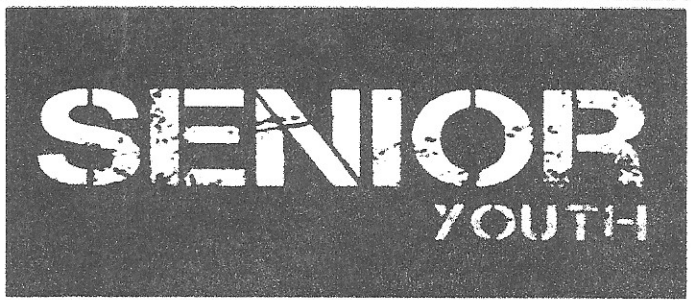


A group for youth grades 3-6

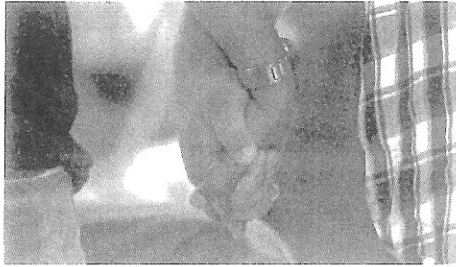
UCC Church Camp

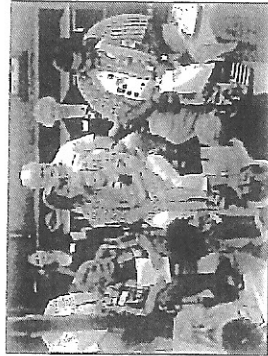

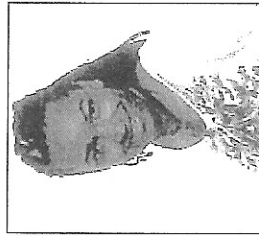

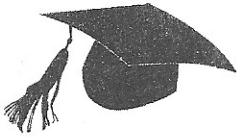
