



First Notes

Sometime in February of this year, I had stumbled across this quote that summed up many of the aspects of life under COVID-19: "Everything takes longer than you expect, and then happens faster than you expect." Those words were truly prophetic. The pace by which the world has been coming back to some semblance of normal since mid-May has been rapid. I'm no social butterfly, but I've been to indoor dining, an indoor music venue, and several outdoor celebrations in the past few weeks. Most days (unless I'm visiting a hospital or clinic), I am not conscious that life has been different. However, I know that the changes were massive and costly (and someday we will need to reckon just how beneficial those costs were in the long run, but that's more territory than I want to cover now).

As we find ourselves in the process of ramping things back up, I want to repeat something I've mentioned a number of times: shutting things down is easy; starting things back up is harder. That said, I can see a time in the near future when life in the church will have all of the elements of worship, education, and fellowship that we had before March, 2020. Putting the pieces back together will take some time.

Yet, there will be more to that process than just plugging in the old pieces: we will need to extend the invitation to the people in our church community and the larger community to come back. People have been in certain habits for over a year. Participation becomes a habit and so does non-participation. We have some work to do in the months ahead. It will be a different kind of work than challenges we faced keeping our ministries going in past sixteen months—challenges that were daunting, to be sure. We will need to pivot to the next phase in the weeks and months ahead.

Speaking of challenges and changes, our church office staffing has settled into an arrangement that I believe will serve the needs of the church in an effective and faithful way. I am pleased to inform you that in mid-June, Linda Bosman joined the support team at Salem and she and Sandy Rabe will be working together to serve as Church Secretary. Linda recently retired from Lakeland University and, having expressed an interest in working in the church office, we gratefully turned that opportunity into a chance to expand the office coverage slightly and a job-share was born.

The office team approach allows us to broaden coverage so that the revised church office hours are: Tuesday and Wednesday 9 a.m. -4 p.m., and Friday 9 a.m. -1 p.m. The office remains closed Mondays and Thursdays. We are grateful and welcome Linda onboard in this capacity. Linda is a member of Salem and currently serves on the consistory.

Things in the life of the church are moving forward. Please pay note to your email and other correspondence from church, as changes in programming and schedules will be shared there and on the website. May the upcoming days of summer provide you with opportunities for rest and recreation.

Thanks and Prayers.

As we make it through the first half of 2021, I want to thank all of you who continue to faithfully support our ministries and mission at Salem.

Our staff has been consistently working to keep us connected, and I pray that congregation members are still feeling connected.

I want to provide you with a summary of our financial situation. First, thanks to all of our members and friends who have been consistent in their support of Salem over the past months. I'd also like to offer a reminder that electronic funds transfer is an option for ongoing support of Salem's ministries. Simply contact the office or me (Mary Mullen), and I will get you the forms necessary to get started.

Fulfilling our 5 for 5 Commitments

As we have been absent from our regular services, we have also lost the opportunity to connect personally regarding our 5 for 5 commitments to the United Church of Christ. During this period,we have had regular commitments to Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM), but other special offerings have been overlooked.

One Great Hour of Sharing channels resources for international programs in health, education and agricultural development, emergency relief, refugee ministries, and both international and domestic disaster response, administered by Wider Church Ministries, this special offering should have been promoted and gifts received in March. Our goal for 2021 is \$750. Please consider a special gift to this important mission.

Strengthen the Church re-imagines and builds the future of the UCC. Shared at the conference and national levels, STC largely supports youth ministries and full-time leaders for new churches in parts of the country where the UCC does not have a strong presence. It also provides support for existing church's new initiatives. Our goal for 2021 was \$400, and thanks to you we have exceeded that goal, receiving a total of \$610.

Our next special mission is *Neighbors in Need*. This special mission supports ministries of justice and compassion throughout the United States, including the Council for American Indian Ministries (CAIM), justice and advocacy, and direct service projects supported by Justice and Local Church Ministries. We will be receiving these gifts in early October, so please keep that in mind as you plan your charitable gifts. Our goal is \$800.

Supporting the Operations of Salem

Last year our blessings flowed as we rolled into the COVID lock-down. We received many generous donations, and we also benefited from a PPP loan of \$26,900. Personally speaking, it was comforting knowing that we had the funds we needed to meet our financial obligations.

This spring I looked into a second PPP loan, but Salem was not eligible, so we do not have that special source of support. That means that we are relying even more on your generosity. I know that it has been a difficult year, and we have all suffered losses, as well as suffering from COVID fatigue.

Gifts so far, year-to-date, are down almost ten percent from last year, not counting the PPP loan. That's a little more than \$9,000 that our regular giving has diminished. Our weekly offerings have been around \$2,600 in May and so far in June, but our operational budget requires about \$5,000 per week.

We just took a small draw on our line of credit, which now has only \$4,800 available, so we will need to consider borrowing from our restricted funds to meet our regular payroll and utilities expenses.

While we have limited in-person gatherings, it's difficult to hold a celebration-type of Festival week, but I would like to ask each of our members and friends to consider doubling your weekly gift for one week in July.

And, if you have been away and not attending and therefore not giving, please consider sending a gift, or better yet, joining a Sunday outdoor service in the coming month. Everyone's gift is important, and your presence is a gift in itself.
