Well, friends, the saga continues.

It appears that most all of what I mentioned in last month's newsletter has come to pass: Omicron is a more contagious variant (much more contagious) but less severe in its effects than the Alpha and Delta were. Vaccination does not prevent transmission and spread, but the fully vaccinated appear to weather infection from the variant better than the non-vaccinated. Most all of us will have some kind of encounter with this variant. The worst part, though, is that while the percentage of people severely sickened is lower, the number of total people infected is much higher, too: a small percentage of a larger number is still pretty significant.

Given concerns for the stretched capacity of our medical system in these days, the Consistory has now voted to suspend in-person worship at least through February 6th. Hopefully, the outbreak of the Omicron variant will come to a peak point soon and will resolve as quickly as it developed.

In the meantime, we approach the future with hope and trust.

And speaking of the future, coming in March will be the start of Lent, on March 2nd—Ash Wednesday. Our worship services for Ash Wednesday and Holy Week will follow the Lectionary-based theme, "Good Enough." The themes and scriptures for upcoming services will be, as follows:

Fifth Sunday in Lent, April 3 – "We Are Fragile" (John 12:1-8)

Palm Sunday, April 10 – "You Are a Group Project" (Luke 19:28-40)

Maundy Thursday, April 14 – "We Are Blessed, Regardless" (John 13:1-17, 31b-35)

Good Friday, April 15 – "Even Today, God Is Here and Somehow, That Is Good Enough" (John 18:1-19:42)

Easter, April 17 – "A Good Enough Faith" (John 10:1-18)

Special Gifts Team Update

Dear Salem family,

Our Special Gifts team met on January 13, 2022 to review the opportunities to share our blessings with our community.

The group reviewed a number of different requests for funding and chose to support the following:

The Gathering - Milwaukee is a meal program that Salem has supported with volunteer efforts in the past. During pre-COVID times we would send groups of youth and adults to their meal centers in Milwaukee to help serve food. As we have not been able to support that effort, we have made a donation of \$500 to the organization to help them manage through these difficult times.

The Sheboygan County Warming Shelter is a more local need. Supported by St. John's UCC in Sheboygan, together with a number of other local churches and groups, the Warming Shelter is a place that provides overnight warmth and food for area homeless people during the winter months. We have also supported this group with a donation of \$500 to this worthwhile local mission.

Our next meeting is scheduled for April 7, and we will be providing more information in the coming months regarding our scholarship program, so please keep an eye out for that.

Applications are available in the Church Office and are due April 21. Please contact any member of the Endowment Committee with questions.



Hurt People Hurt People

Using a Mental Health Focus to Address and Prevent Domestic and Foreign Terrorism

Extremism and terrorism have seldom been addressed nor understood from a public health lens. In my anti-hate work over past 10 years, I have come to conclusion that our country is headed in the wrong direction when it comes to both addressing and preventing domestic and foreign terrorism. My presentation will highlight what we could do to build a more resilient society against targeted violence and help



those who are currently entangled in the mindset of extremism themselves. In this presentation, I will highlight the work that Parents4Peace has done in the past and is currently embarked in now, provide resources that can help families exit from hate, and speak about the need for the mental health focus to terrorism. I will also speak about why the need for Interfaith collaboration and understanding is crucial to addressing the concern of religious-based extremism.

Pardeep Kaleka is the executive director of the Interfaith Conference of Greater Milwaukee, a de-radicalization expert and a trauma-focused clinical therapist. As a first-generation immigrant from India, Kaleka has spent more than 20 years in the public arenas of law enforcement, education and social services. He has worked on issues of violence prevention and coalition-building across ethnic, racial and religious cultures, and has helped trauma survivors and perpetrators with recovery. As a consultant, he has developed policies and practices to help mental health workers, social service practitioners, law enforcement agents and educators build healthier, safer, more inclusive communities.

In 2012, following the hate killings at the Oak Creek Sikh Temple, he founded Serve2Unite, an organization nationally recognized for bridging school and community groups. Today, he helps families steer their loved ones away from domestic and foreign violent extremism as a clinician with Parents4Peace and works towards building faith inclusivity.


