Although I am far from the most tech savvy person in the world, I have been paying some attention to online articles about Artificial Intelligence (AI). Like every other technological innovation, AI shows potential for great benefit and great harm. On the positive side, it could open up a wider range of consumer choices delivered more efficiently, it can analyze huge sets of data more quickly than even the current systems can, and it can make the delivery of truly personalized medicine a possibility. AI can write research papers, letters, and perhaps even sermons (although the day I use AI as a tool for crafting sermons is the day I hang it up...). On the other hand, AI automation could lead to job losses, AI algorithms could manipulate social opinions and help spread propaganda, totalitarian states could use it to tighten social surveillance, and whole weapons systems could be controlled by AI. Given the very human tendency to misuse new powers and abilities, we could be in for a rough next few decades.

Yet, the strangest—and perhaps the weirdest—application of AI comes from a South Korean tech company which allows people to talk with their dead loved ones after collecting photos and video footage of them. Part of the process involves a seven-hour interview with the to-be-deceased to gather data and life stories. AI can be used to synthesize an individual's mannerisms, facial tics, and speech patterns to give grieving families an opportunity to meet a "realistic" representation of their loved one. Of course, this use of AI isn't cheap: it costs between \$12,000 and \$24,000 to do the upfront data gathering and each "meeting" with a loved one (in the private "memorial showroom") costs an additional \$1,200 a session.

Apparently "immortality" comes with a hefty price tag.

Personally, I would have no use for this application of AI. No matter how "realistic" the final product may seem, I would know in my heart of hearts that I'm not speaking with my father or my in-laws in such a

session. Furthermore, I can see where this technology could create problems for some people in coming to some sense of closure with their grief. Thank you, no.

What does this application of AI have to do with the season of Eastertide?

I am thankful that the lessons of an Easter faith remind us that eternal life does not come through AI, but through the power of God to make all things new. What tempers the pain of loss is the promise of the resurrection, not some holographic image. In the future I will experience fellowship with family and friends who have gone on ahead of me and it won't cost me a good share of money to do so. I will place my final trust in God.

Human abilities are no match for the might of God in helping us to deal with the losses we face in this world.

May the remaining days of Eastertide and the arrival of Pentecost be a blessing to you and those you love.



In addition, the team will consider other requests for funding of projects that will enhance the missions and ministries of this church.

We encourage any Salem member to consider applying for a scholarship--please submit your request to the Special Gifts Team before July 10, 2023.

As a reminder, the gifts are available to support any kind of continuing education--from an individual class that you may be taking to technical college to any four-year college. Funds can be used for tuition, books, or other needs associated with continuing your education.

Applying is simple. You must be accepted or enrolled in an accredited college or school. You can request an application form from the church office, complete and return the form along with a brief essay telling us about your field of study, your career plans and a list of any other scholarship or grant funding you have received, if applicable. CONFERENCE OFFICE TRANSITIONS TO DAYCHOLAH

Conference Minister Franz Rigert provides this update on the move of the Wisconsin Conference UCC office:

On April 12 we bid farewell to the Trost Center. After weeks of packing and preparations, Badger Brothers Movers filled a 26-foot truck, delivering most of the items to the new Conference offices located in the lower level of Spring Grove Lodge at Daycholah Center, then proceeded to First Congregational UCC in Ripon, where we have secured an additional room for storage. Already, the staff is settling in and excited about this expanded partnership with United Church Camps, Inc.

The sale of the Trost Center, for \$1.35 million, is now complete and there is a spirit of gladness that our beautiful conference home will be transformed into a holistic

health clinic, bringing wellness and hope to people for many years to come. With this transition, the Conference will complete our investment in Daycholah, providing UCCI financial stability and the promise of a multiyear reboot following the challenges of the COVID pandemic.

We expect some members of the Conference staff to be present at Daycholah each week from Tuesday through Thursday, although all of us are available by email and cellphone whether we are working remotely or on site.

For those who will attend the Annual Meeting, Sunday morning spiritual options will take place at Daycholah Center, and we will offer tours of the new office space. In this Eastertide, we celebrate a new era in our shared Conference Life.


