



# **First Notes**

In my reading this week I stumbled across an online article from *Crisis* magazine, written by John L. Grondelski, dated November 27, 2014, which offered a warning about the fate of the Thanksgiving holiday. He had noted that most of the American civic/national holidays—except for Thanksgiving and the Fourth of July—had their original purposes hollowed out and replaced by an emphasis on commercialism. However, he saw the writing on wall when it came to Thanksgiving as "Black Friday" was starting its creep into the holiday itself.

Sure enough, the signs he saw nine years ago have come to pass. "Black Friday" has crept into "Brown Thursday" as sales have begun at 6 p.m. on Thanksgiving Day (as well as "Cyber Monday" for online sales the Monday following Thanksgiving). As an aside, the push to start the holiday sales on Thanksgiving Day is something that, frankly, I've never understood: we have had people bolt out of family Thanksgiving dinners as soon as the plates were cleared to go to these things. Go figure.

As Grondelski pointed out, there is something in our increasingly secular culture that gets uncomfortable with tying the holiday to the traditions of a people who recognized that their very survival depended on the care and concern of Divine Providence. It's better to replace that heritage with something less threatening and more useful—like commercialism.

And here we are.

Even for persons who have ties to traditional Judeo-Christian beliefs, it is easy to make the

emphasis of Thanksgiving Day more about what we are thankful for instead of who we should be directing our gratitude towards. However, we will have the opportunity to properly ground our celebration of thanksgiving in this season and remember that we, too, are persons whose survival depends on the care and concern of Divine Providence. On Wednesday, November 22 at 6:30 p.m., we are invited to share in a celebration of thanksgiving with our brothers and sisters at First Congregational UCC at their church at 6:30 p.m. (please note the time). Our celebration will include music from the choirs of both congregations. There will be time for refreshments and fellowship following worship.
