



First Notes

Although the calendar on our refrigerator at home informs me that autumn did not begin until September 22nd, other happenings tell me that the season began well before that date. Schools are back in session. All things pumpkin spice are on the store shelves. The NFL is playing games on Sunday afternoons. And the programming year has started up again at Salem.

It has been good to see young people back in church school and Confirmation. It has been good to hear the Chancel Choir sing during worship. Those are all familiar landmarks of church life. The pace of things will pick up as we progress through the fall. Already (at this writing), I am working on the hymn list for December, which encompasses Advent and Christmas. Time marches on quickly.

As planning for the remaining months of 2024 ramps up, I will share with you a change for the Christmas schedule that has been discussed in Worship Team and Council over the past several months: the discontinuation of the 10:00 p.m. Christmas Eve worship service. I make that announcement with some sadness: in my early years at Salem, the only true worship service we had on Christmas Eve was at 11:00 p.m. (our other offering was a church school Christmas program for the upper grades) and that service carried with it a rich tradition. Over the years, we expanded our Christmas Eve service offerings to include a 7:00 p.m. and a 4:30 p.m. service, but we noticed some trends emerging: the 4:30 p.m. service became the clear-cut choice for most people. In time, the 7:30 p.m. service became the first service to be removed from the schedule due to declining attendance, but the 11:00 p.m. service began to see a decline in numbers, too. In response to the criticism that 11:00 p.m. was too late, we moved the service to 10:00 p.m. but the decline continued. This sort of trend has been reflected in other congregations, as well: there has been a reluctance to get out to church late on a winter evening that cut across all traditions.

In 2022, we had about 20 persons in attendance at 10:00 p.m. and chose to give it one more year to see what would happen. When we had the same number of people in 2023, we made the decision to discuss discontinuing the service.

Although the 10:00 p.m. service will be discontinued, we will take one of the more popular features of that service—the candle lighting service at the conclusion of worship—and incorporate that into the 4:30 p.m. service.

Well, that covers a bit of territory for the first Front Page of the new program year. Until next month.

CONGREGATIONAL MEETING - OCTOBER 13

This is notification to all Salem members of a congregational meeting to be held on Sunday, October 13, 2024 following our 10:00 a.m. worship service.

PURPOSE: CHURCH FINANCIAL STATUS

As discussed at this year's Annual meeting, the Church's financial needs are not being met with weekly giving alone. Since 2022, in order to help fund operating expenses, the Church has utilized \$60,000 in funds bequeathed to the Church by Einale Mayer. By January of this year, the bequest balance had been depleted. Since February, the Church has utilized \$15,500 of its \$20,000 line of credit to keep up with the basic needs of the Church, such as utilities, wages, and insurance. Should the line of credit be fully utilized, as is anticipated, the Church faces the reality of having to choose which bills are paid and which are not.

At the September Council meeting, the Council authorized a Special Congregational Meeting to be held on Sunday, October 13, 2024, immediately after worship. The intent of the meeting is to discuss the Church's financial status and how to ensure that the Church continues to operate for many more years.

Members of the Church Council and Finance Team will be available after worship on Sundays, September 29 and October 6 to answer questions and hear your suggestions.

THERE IS STILL TIME TO VOTE FOR HOPE

In 2023, the United Church of Christ launched a campaign calling for action at the federal level of government to address the overlapping crises of climate and inequality. Through the Climate Hope Cards campaign, churches across the country collected 8,000 postcards that were delivered to the Environmental Protection Agency as part of an effort to save thousands of lives, address societal inequities, and get our nation on track to meet its climate goals.

In 2024, the UCC is building upon the success of this effort with a new campaign called <u>Vote for Climate</u> <u>Hope.</u> Between now and November 1, UCC churches are encouraged to take the *Climate Hope Voter Pledge--*



and make a commitment to "vote as an act of hope for present and future generations." Those who pledge to vote will receive a confirmation email with helpful voter information, a one-time reminder of their pledge to vote in the week before the election, and a chance to win one of ten Vote for Climate Hope tumblers featuring the artwork from our 2024 Climate Hope Art Contest for children and youth.
