



First Notes

Recently, I had a conversation with a colleague who had learned of my future plans. Early in the conversation he made the comment, "So, you're going through a series of 'lasts,' aren't you?" "I guess so," I replied, "and it's been that way since the beginning of August, actually."

One of the "lasts" that is coming up is the pastoring of this congregation during a national election—the tenth such election since I've been here. That may seem like an event to take note of, especially since I have never once advocated for a political candidate or a referendum issue in all of my time here. I figure that's not my role as pastor and teacher in this congregation. I certainly encourage all of you to make informed, prayerful decisions when you enter the voting booth, but I'd never presume to tell you how I think you should vote.

However, I do think that there is some pastoral work that is connected with the backdrop of a national election, but most of it takes place after the election. The big question is this: how do we, as brothers and sisters in Christ, make our peace with the results and live together as citizens of one nation? A key to that answer lies in being able to understand why people who differ from us take the positions that they do. I have found that, while I may not agree with how some people think and vote, I can understand why they take the positions they do—and it's not because they're evil or stupid. If you can get a handle on the "why" it's easier to humanize the people we disagree with politically instead of demonizing them.

The second key to living together as citizens of one nation is to realize that the nation is sharply divided along certain lines, sometimes 50/50 in some cases. An election is not to change that fact. Even if their causes lose, the persons advocating those causes are not going

to disappear and go away. They are not going to be conquered or vanquished. Those factions are a part of the nation, and we must learn to live with our differences. Civil war is not an option.

The last key—and one that I've stressed often, I realize—is that the ultimate redemption of humanity is not going to be achieved through political means. Good governance can be a tremendous benefit for humankind, but like most tools available for our use, it can be horribly misused. Jesus warned his disciples of that sort of thing, saying that the persons in power among the Gentiles seek to lord power over one another, but that among his followers it should not be so (Matthew 20:25). The acquisition of power for power's sake is the pitfall of relying on politics as the main source of human redemption. Psalm 146:3 cautions, "Do not put your trust in princes, in mortals, in whom there is no help." God, alone, is the sovereign ruler of this world. We must never forget that fact.

In any event, it is my hope that we can gather together in worship with our brothers and sisters from First Congregational UCC and give thanks to God on November 27th at 7:00 p.m. for all of the blessings we have received as God's people. Remember, the Apostle Paul exhorts us to be thankful in all circumstances (1 Thessalonians 5:18) and there is much to for which to give thanks.

A tax-savvy way to benefit Salem

Want to reduce your taxable income AND help support Salem UCC? A Qualified Charitable Distribution (QCD) is a tax-efficient way for those 70 ½ or older to donate from their IRA, while also counting towards your annual Required Minimum Distribution.

QCDs do not qualify for a charitable deduction but do avoid your taxable income. Always consult your personal tax advisor to learn how a QCD can benefit both you and Salem.

To direct a Qualified Charitable Distribution from your IRA, contact your IRA custodian and direct them to make a gift from your IRA to Salem UCC. Request that your name be included with the transfer information so we can thank you for your gift! They can mail it direct to the church.

Message from Financial Secretary

Dear Friends in Christ.

As many of you are aware, Salem held a special congregational meeting on October 13. The purpose of the meeting was to share information and discuss possible approaches to improving our church's financial wellbeing.

Here is where we stand with our General Fund during the first 44 weeks of 2024:

- General Fund Contributions totaled \$134,568 (\$3,058 average weekly giving).
- General Fund Expenses totaled \$175,430 (\$3,987 average weekly expenses).
- We should consider \$4,000 our weekly giving goal for General Fund. Regular updates on weekly giving will be provided in upcoming bulletin announcements.

We are very generous! Unfortunately, Salem's General Fund income has not been sufficient to meet those expenses. **The average weekly shortfall of \$929** has been supplemented with money from other funds, including a line of credit. We have also benefited from band concert concession proceeds and church picnic donations. Additional support came from SCRIP rebates, Zoar Cemetery Fund, Special Gifts and others.

Salem's Council and Finance / Generosity
Teams have been hard at work trying to find
ways to lower expenses and increase income.
We are grateful to many who have increased
their financial giving to help meet the needs.
We have also recently been granted funds from
Endowment to help lower our line of credit debt.

Please note the status of **Contributions for our 5 for 5 Benevolences**, so far this year:

- Our Church's Wider Mission (OCWM) -\$7,417 received (Goal is \$10,000)
- Christmas Fund \$0 received (Goal is \$700)
- Neighbors in Need \$408 received (Goal is \$800)
- One Great Hour of Sharing \$635 received (Goal is \$750)
- Strengthen the Church \$635 received (Goal is \$400)

I am pleased to report that Salem will continue to support Sheboygan County Interfaith Organization (SCIO) in 2024.Our contribution will be funded through a generous grant of \$1,000 from the Endowment Fund.

If you are still reading, you may be wondering what this means for each of us. My response to you is that is entirely up to each one as we are moved by the Holy Spirit. We are called to be generous, even extravagantly so! As individuals, families, and as a congregation, we need to take a closer look at our stewardship. Are we utilizing all of our resources of time, talent and treasure as fully as we can?

I do not have all of the answers, and I do not have the power to foresee the future. However, I faithfully continue to assist as I am able during the time ahead and challenge you to do likewise. If you want to discuss how to contribute electronically or through qualified charitable distributions or other means, please let me know. I also invite you to consider participating with any of our ministry teams or join in other opportunities that are being offered. We do have a church that is alive and active. Please prayerfully consider how you may help Salem UCC continue to thrive and grow. Thank you!
